BOARD REPORT

BOARD OF DIRECTORS APPROVED ACTIONS ITEMS - OCTOBER 23, 2020

PAT FOX, VICE PRESIDENT

Electronic Vote Ratification

Interim Rule Update: Approved a motion to ratify the following: A unanimous electronic motion was made and passed on October 9, 2020, to update the Interim Rules and Regulations for Use of the Clubhouse, Pools/Spa, and Amenities to open the children's playground to non-residents/guests.

Regular October 23, 2020 Board Meeting Votes

Interim Rule Update: Approved a motion to change the Interim Rules & Regulations to open the outdoor facilities to non-residents/guests who are accompanied by a resident, however they are not allowed inside the Clubhouse.

2019 Audit: Approved a motion based upon the recommendation of the Budget & Finance Committee to approve the 2019 audit and that it be signed by either the President or Treasurer.

2021 Draft Budget: Approved a motion to approve the draft budget as presented by the Budget and Finance Committee and that it be sent to the owners for their review and comment. The budget will be voted on by the Board at the December 2, 2020, Annual Meeting.

Tree Removal: Approved a motion based upon the recommendation of the Landscape & Irrigation Committee to approve the expenditure of \$1,500 to remove five trees.

Tree Maintenance: Approved a motion agreeing to the Landscape & Irrigation Committee request to get a bid from Bartlett Tree for tree maintenance work to be done in 2021.

Well Testing: Approved a motion to approve up to \$29,500 for testing of all five irrigation wells based upon the Landscape and Irrigation Committee recommendation. There are access issues with Well 3 that the contractor will assess while they are onsite and provide recommendations. If Well 3 is not tested, those funds

will not be spent.



Walking Path Repair: Approved a motion to have the General Manager get proposals from asphalt contractors on cost and best way to handle invasive tree roots and have the work completed as soon as can be done depending on weather.

Walking Path Closure: Approved a motion to close the path until it is repaired pending confirmation that the Association has the authority to close it.

Seasonal Lighting

Seasonal lighting is permitted for illumination within a 30-day period prior to and a 12-day period after the holiday season. Seasonal lights may be installed between November 15 and January 15 but will only be illuminated as stated above. Should extreme weather conditions become a factor in removal of seasonal lighting within the designated timeframe, the Covenants Committee or HOA Management, in its sole discretion, may grant an extension of the allowable period of removal. Seasonal lighting and electrical cords shall be located so as to respect driveway snow plowing operations and sidewalk snow removal operations. Cords shall never be located over public sidewalks.



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The SV Book Club met on October 20 to discuss *The Great Alone* by Kristin Hannah. Beaming in were: Joe Sikes, Jan Withers, Bob Nilsson, Jim & Kathryn Buckheit, Sue Goldberg, JoAnn Walker, Peggy Decker, Celia Love, Charlotte Kurst, DeAnn Cheyne, and Mary Jo Volpicelli. Before we started, we discussed donating to the Friends of Queen Anne's Library at the excellent suggestion of DeAnn Cheyne. If book clubs don't support our library, who will? We collected \$190 to send to the library fund drive.

The central character of this month's book, Ernt Albright, recently returned from being held as a prisoner of war (POW) in Vietnam. He is a changed man dealing with the ravages of post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD). His previously idyllic life with his wife, Cora, and daughter, Leni, has turned into a struggle with Ernt being unable to hold a job and turning to alcohol to fight depression. His family loves him and forgives his bouts of anger and drunkenness. They keep moving from place to place, looking for a fresh new start.

Ernt receives a letter from Earl Harlan, father of his closest friend, Bo, who was killed in Vietnam. It seems Earl has been searching for Ernt to tell him that Bo left Ernt a cabin in Alaska in his will. The Harlan clan is eager for Ernt to bring his family north to live off the land at the end of civilization. Ernt believes this is just the new start he needs, and his excitement convinces Cora and Leni to follow him to start anew in the wild outskirts of Homer, Alaska.

The move starts well, as the challenge of learning to live off the land brings them together. Many colorful characters help the family learn how to survive in the demanding conditions of the Far North. In addition to his PTSD, Ernt has an abiding distrust of government, spurred on by his Vietnam experience. He finds old Earl Harlan to be a like-minded isolationist with a large clan living together, depending on their own wiles to

survive. Together they share an unhealthy disdain for people attempting to attract tourism to the local village of Kaneq. Tom Walker, a successful business owner, is their antithesis, seeking to improve the local economy by bringing jobs and tourists. Tom is no outsider, being a second generation Alaskan and a skilled outdoorsman. Ernt immediately becomes jealous when he finds Cora befriending the Walker family.

Many normal plot twists occur. Leni finds a boyfriend, cars roll into snowbanks, grizzly bears are encountered in the wild, wolves kill all the livestock, and people fall into rivers and freeze. But ultimately, Cora and Leni realize that the biggest threat they face in Alaska is being confined with Ernt and his demons during the long dark northern winter. How they survive this dilemma keeps the pages turning to the end. I was thinking about being confined to our houses in March and April. But at least wolves didn't eat the Instacart person when they brought my food. And, Acme doesn't deliver to Alaska anyway!





The Club read another Kristin Hannah book, *The Nightingale*, earlier in the year and gave it one of our highest grades. While the club generally enjoyed *The Great Alone*, some of the members (including me) didn't find the characters and storytelling as compelling as the previous book. The internal struggles of the Albright family were also pretty dark. Accordingly, the Club graded the book as 7.15 which is close to average. That included Bob's grade of pi. Bob occasionally finds the discussion of the book more enthralling than the book. We may have to find him a book whisperer.

CLUBHOUSE LANDSCAPE FACELIFT

About 15 years ago, the newly constructed SV Clubhouse opened to residents with surrounding plantings installed. As with any living landscape, some plants eventually outgrew their assigned spaces, while others experienced declining health. The SV HOA Board approved a renovation plan that was compiled by coordinated efforts of the SV Landscape & Irrigation Committee and the Level Green Landscape contractor.

The overall plan is divided into six phases, with the hope that all phases will be completed by late spring, 2021.

PHASE 1. (Completed October 2020)

The outer foundation periphery of the new expansion and billiard room now include:

- *Dwarf oakleaf hydrangea shrubs
- *Inkberry shrubs
- *Little Bluestem grasses
- *Switchgrasses

Feather Reed grasses

*Pennsylvania sedges

PHASE 2. (Completed October 2020)

Both wing beds on either side of the Clubhouse entrance now include:

Miscanthus grasses

Additional knockout roses

*Purple and white coneflower perennials

*Black-eyed Susan perennials

Catmint perennials

PHASE 3. (Scheduled for completion in early spring 2021)

The Clubhouse front elevation will include:

Nellie Stevens holly tree

Deutzia shrubs

*Switchgrasses

Hosta perennials

Astilbe perennials

*St John's Wort ground cover

PHASE 4. (Scheduled for completion in early spring 2021)

The pavilion and bocce court areas will include:

Spirea shrubs

*Dwarf oakleaf hydrangea shrubs

Fairy roses

*Amsonia perennials

PHASE 5. (Scheduled for completion in early spring 2021)

The outdoor pool area will include:

Hosta perennials

PHASE 6. (Scheduled for completion in late spring 2021)

The foundation of the east-facing elevation of the Clubhouse will include:

Cherry Laurel shrubs

*Dwarf Winterberry shrubs

Russian Sage perennials

Purple Coneflower perennials









*The plants listed in *italics*, are classified as "native" to our geographical region. They typically are resistant to pests and disease, tolerant of climate extremes (drought, excessive rainfall), and do not require fertilization. Not only will these natives continue to enhance the outside appearance of SV's flagship amenity site, but will also have a positive environmental impact by providing food and pollinator sites for local wildlife.

HOME SAFETY

SYMPHONY VILLAGE COMMUNITY EMERGENCY RESPONSE TEAM (SV CERT)

Since its establishment, the Symphony Village CERT volunteers have explored ways to provide improvements and modifications to our community and homes to help ensure our safety and prevent accidents. We have collected numerous home safety articles that are available on the SV CERT website at https://sv-info.org/cert-files/homeowners.html. This information covers the following areas:



Electrical

Information on shutting off electricity and what to do during power outages and electrical storms.

Fire Extinguishers

How to use them (including a video) and how to maintain them.

HVAC

Understanding your system, a maintenance checklist, setting the thermostat, and winterizing A/C units.

Hot Water Heater

Shutting it off, how it works, and maintenance tips.

House Water

Water shutoff, what to do if there is a leak, and maintenance of outside faucets.

Outdoor Grills

Dos and don'ts on using them.

Propane

How to safely turn it off and propane safety tips.

Smoke Detectors

Maintenance and use including carbon monoxide detectors.


Roofing

Roof inspection, identifying damage, indoor/outdoor inspections.

Town Water Shutoff

Where it's located, how to shut the water off, and water meter access.

My husband was a doll building shelves all around our garage for storage of holiday decorations, keepsakes, and things that should have been trashed. That was six years ago, before his stroke, before I turned 70. Now two gentlemen on my block have fallen down the sky basement steps while bringing items down to the first floor. The handwriting was on the wall, and the floor I would fall onto, not if but when, I would fall off the ladder getting decorations down for Halloween, Thanksgiving, Christmas, Spring, and Summer. I kept my bins very light; but still, balancing with one hand on the ladder, reaching up to grab a plastic bin, dropping the bin to the



ground, was pretty scary at times. For the boxes I did not want to drop, I would climb down the ladder while holding a plastic bin—Dumb and Dangerous!

Enter Aux Lift. An Aux Lift is a system of cables and a 4-foot by 8-foot rack that is attached to my garage ceiling. I can, with a press of the remote, lower and raise the lift to my advantage.
