Symphony Village Chili Cook-off & Tailgate Party


What's better than football and chili? How about sharing it with your friends and neighbors and a chance to take home the title of "Symphony Village's Best Chili Cook" (prizes

Caring and Sharing



The Caring and Sharing Benefit Dinner was a great success. Free dinners were served to 260 senior citizens and Chesterwye residents. Ten cakes were donated by Symphony Village residents and ten dinner tickets were purchased by the Outreach Program. The dinners were cooked and served by the members of the Grasonville American Legion Post. The left over

cakes were given to the Chesterwye residents and you would have thought it was Christmas by the reaction of the delighted group. It is always so rewarding to give and see such overwhelming joy from the recipients. The benefit collected \$2,701, which will be partially matched by a coalition of local churches. All funds will aid disadvantaged families in Queen Anne's County.

Hospice Center in Centreville

At our October meeting, the Outreach Program Committee voted to pledge \$25,000 to the Hospice Building Fund for a patient's room. A letter was sent to Kevin Sullivan of Caruso Homes asking them to partner with us on our commitment. They responded that they would like to join us in a 50/50 partnership with a donation of \$12,500. The Outreach Committee will cover our portion of the pledge by using the \$9,000 revenue from our Village Cookbook (600 books at \$15) plus money from our garage sales and future fundraisers.

Later, Hospice of Queen Anne's informed us that an anonymous donor from Symphony Village donated \$25,000, which also could be used as part of our pledge. This donation allowed us to increase our pledge to \$50,000 and gave us the opportunity to choose a higher priced gift selection for the new Hospice facility. The choices were a fountain and reflecting pool, a family conference room, or the kitchen. To make a more informed selection, a group of members were taken on a tour of the new center and reported back that the kitchen was the best choice.

The kitchen is expected to be the center of activity for volunteers and family members cooking for residents and guests. It is a lovely room with a small solarium overlooking the fountain and reflecting pool. It will be a great place to showcase our own Village Cookbook! At the November Outreach meeting, the committee voted to choose the kitchen as our gift to the Hospice Center with the full intent of providing volunteers to cook cookies, soups, and whatever else may be needed. Nancie Cameron has already volunteered to bake her wonderful cakes for special occasions.

After the Center is opened in January 2008, we will be asking for more volunteers to help in the kitchen. A plaque will be placed in the kitchen and on a wall in the entrance of the Center recognizing the donation from Symphony Village Residents and Waterford Centreville, LLC. A formal presentation of the plaque will be made to Hospice at the beginning of the Annual HOA Meeting.

Symphony Village - Volunteer in Action

I work part time in the Planned Giving Office at the Foundation Fighting Blindness working with donors on charitable gift annuities, bequests, and different types of charitable trusts. You may not have heard of the Foundation Fighting Blindness, but you are probably familiar with macular degeneration, either through personal experience

or by knowing someone who is affected. The Foundation's mission is to drive the research to find preventions and cures for retinal degenerative diseases, most

notably macular degeneration and retinitis pigmentosa.

Besides the national headquarters, which is located in Owings Mills, MD, there are several regional offices throughout the country. The Foundation also has a National Network of Volunteer Groups (known as Chapters) that raises funds, increase public awareness, and provide

support to their communities. The closest one to us right now is in Fallston, MD, but there is great interest in creating a chapter on the Eastern Shore.

There are many ways to get involved and help the Foundation fulfill its mission. Besides raising money through the normal fundraising methods and the above mentioned chapters it also sponsors special events throughout the country where volunteers are needed. The most recent, and highly successful, are the VisionWalks, walk-a-thon fundraising programs. There will be one in Baltimore on May 3, 2008. This is a great way to be involved. Walkers are needed, and if one cannot walk for some reason, he/she can still support the walk and be considered a 'virtual walker'.



The Symphony Village Bird Club had a wonderful outing to Pickering Creek Audubon Center in Easton on October 20. On a nature walk led by Wayne Bell, Maryland Ornithological Society, we identified over two dozen birds and fleetingly saw and heard even more, even



(known fondly as "yellow butts") and palm warblers flit among the trees on the forest edge. Walking through the various habitats, we enjoyed the variety and diversity of bird life that each had to offer.

The Bird Club traveled to Bombay Hook National Wildlife Refuge in Smyrna, Delaware, on November 8. We motored along the Auto Tour route, lingering at tour stops highlighted in the brochure to look for birds. Thousands of snow geese and Canada geese have arrived for the winter. The views of the marsh were spectacular from two observation towers. We again thrilled at the sight of a Northern Harrier as well as a flicker, ducks of many varieties, a great blue heron, and many others. Lunch in Sudlersville capped off a successful trip. Our next trip will be to the Eastern Neck National Wildlife Refuge in Rock Hall, Maryland, on December 1. We'll walk some of the trails and lunch in Rock Hall. Please sign up in the Activities Book.

Pickering Creek Audubon Center by Linda Blume

The Pickering Creek Audubon Center near Easton is a Sanctuary of the Chesapeake Audubon Society. It offers a low-key environment and varying habitats in which to look for wildlife. You can <u>expect</u> to see birds and a wide variety of plant life, and you <u>may</u> also glimpse mammals (the endangered Delmarva Fox Squirrel, rabbits, muskrats), reptiles and amphibians (turtles, salamanders), and insects (butterflies, dragonflies).

Pickering Creek offers a number of nature trails through different habitats – pick up a trail map at the office or explore on your own. There are specialized gardens in season. Once the drought breaks, the freshwater pond should once again be filled with water and populated

with over-wintering waterfowl. There is a live reptile and amphibian display in a building near the office, and there is a mounted bird and mammal display in the office building itself. They offer canoe rentals, in season, members only.

There is no admission charge to the Center. The office is open: Monday – Friday, 8:30 a.m. – 5:00 p.m.; Saturday, 10:00 a.m. – 4:00 p.m.; closed Sunday. The trails and gardens, however, are open dawn to dusk daily. "Take nothing but pictures, leave nothing but footprints." Pickering Creek has special events and seasonal programs yearround. Look on their website at www.pickeringcreek.org for the schedule or telephone them at 410-822-4903 to see what is coming up.

The Center also has a very active Volunteer Program. They were present at the Symphony Village Volunteer Fair in September, and they would welcome SV residents into the Program.

Projects vary widely, and there should be something of interest for anyone who wants to volunteer. For information, contact Beth Wasden at 410-822-4903.

Directions (about 17 miles from Symphony Village):

Take Route 213 South to Route 50. Turn left onto Route 50 East. Route 662 crosses Route 50 several times: take the <u>second</u> turn for Route 662 -- Longwoods Road. (This correct turn is just after mile marker 58 on Route 50.) Proceed through Longwoods, pass a little red school house on the right, and pass Rabbit Hill Road on the left. Turn right onto Sharp Road, the first right turn after Rabbit Hill Road. Go about 1.5 miles. Turn right onto a continuation of Sharp Road. Go about 1.25 miles. Look for the Pickering Creek sign on the right. Turn right onto Audubon Drive into the Center. The driveway comes to a "T". The unmanned Welcome Center is straight ahead, and parking is to the left. Several trails start in this area. To get to the office and education buildings, follow the gravel driveway on the right until you reach a cluster of buildings. The office is straight ahead, and parking is to the left, between the buildings, down the hill.

TRAVEL ARTICLE OF THE MONTH

Niagara Falls and Cape Cod By Kay Blair

During the last few weeks of September, we took a trip in our 5th wheel trailer and headed for Niagara Falls, New York, and then on to Cape Cod, Massachusetts. The weather could not have been better--just perfect! We were very excited because we had never been to Niagara and we



were not disappointed--the Falls are remarkable. We stayed on the American side and walked over to the Canadian side via the Rainbow Bridge. On the Canadian side there is a trolley system, and for \$2.00 you can purchase an all-day pass and travel around the area. The real bonus however, was the entertaining drivers. One sang an Elvis song, another told jokes--what fun!

The very best part of the Falls experience for us was the "Maid of the Mist" boat ride and the "Cave of the Winds." If you have never done these, don't miss them on your next visit. They

give you a plastic raincoat and sandals to wear and an elevator takes you to the bottom of the Falls. From there you may walk up as many as three levels. The highest point is named Hurricane Point. When you reach the top, you are only 10 feet from the "Bridal Veil Falls." It is very exciting and very wet!!

We spent three days at the Falls, then headed east toward Cape Cod. We took a day and a half to reach our destination. One of the great benefits of retirement and RV'ing is there is no need to rush--just relax and enjoy the moments.

We always stay in Provincetown, Cape Cod. It is known as "P" town to the locals and is located on the very tip of the Cape. The population is primarily Portuguese watermen and their families. At the east end of town is Provincetown Inn, a very old inn with murals dating back to the early 1900s. It is also the first landing place of the Pilgrims. Unfortunately, over the years we have witnessed more and more condos being built and in the process taking away many old and wonderful places. This is PROGRESS??????? We certainly don't think so.

We drove down to the beautiful National Seashore. The seashore is 1/2 the entire shoreline of the Cape. We took the nature walk. The walk was designed to accommodate the blind. The walk has a rope railing with markings where the steps are, and all of the information plaques are in English as well as Braille. How great is that!

On our last night we walked up and down Commercial Street, the main drag, and enjoyed talking about what a wonderful vacation it had been. Paul's biggest thing about vacations is eating which is the main reason he loves cruises. We both enjoy New England seafood. I try and try to get my "fill" of lobster while there, but I have never accomplished this.

The biggest disappointment, if you can call it that, was we were too early to catch the fall foliage. All in all it was a wonderful vacation and after driving 1800 miles, we returned home safely.

In Case of Emergency (ICE)

The concept of "ICE" is catching on quickly. It is a method of contact during emergency situations. As cell phones are carried by the majority of the population, all you need to do is store the number of a contact person or persons who should be contacted during an emergency under the name "ICE" (In Case of Emergency). The idea came from a paramedic who found that when he went to the scene of an accident, the patient almost always had a mobile phone, but they didn't know which number to call. If you were to be involved in an accident or were taken ill, the people attending you would be able to call your emergency contact. A further suggestion is that if you plan to use this, put a space before the word ICE so that it comes up first in the directory.

Safety Alert

There have been several near accidents recently at the intersection of Symphony Boulevard and Taylor Mill Road. Since more traffic is using the construction entrance to Symphony Village, you MUST come to a complete STOP at the stop sign on Symphony Boulevard and check carefully in both directions before turning right onto Taylor Mill Road. Pumpkin Bars

2 cups flour

2 tsp. baking powder

½ tsp. salt

2 tsp. cinnamon

½ tsp. baking soda

Combine dry ingredients together.

Mix oil, sugar, pumpkin, and eggs thoroughly.

Add sifted dry ingredients and beat well. Add nuts if desired.

Pour onto greased baking sheet (jelly roll pan).

Bake 30-35 minutes at 350 degrees.

Frosting:

3 oz. cream cheese, softened

3/4 stick margarine

1 tbsp. milk or half and half

1 tsp. vanilla

2 cups pumpkin

1 cup vegetable oil

1 cup chopped nuts (optional)

2 cups sugar

4 eggs

1 ³/₄ cup powdered sugar

Beat together until smooth. Frost top of cooled bars. Cut into squares or bar shapes.
