St. Martin's Ministries

I retired on July 1, 2002, from a wonderful 35 years as a teacher and school principal. My first thought in retirement was "to give back" to an organization called **St. Martin's Ministries** sponsored by the Benedictine Sisters of Ridgely, Maryland. The Benedictine Sisters taught for the Diocese of Wilmington at St. Elizabeth's School, and I was privileged to be one of their students for twelve years. In addition to their stellar teaching ministry in Wilmington and the Benedictine Programs and Services, which respond to the educational needs of children and young adults with developmental disabilities, the Sisters sponsor



St. Martin's Barn and House. **The Barn** addresses the needs of the rural poor by providing emergency food, clothing, and furniture. The transitional residential facility, **St. Martin's House**, offers a safe and comfortable environment for homeless women and their children. Its goals are to empower residents to make a life change by providing the educational components necessary to achieve self-sufficiency, self-respect, and self-confidence. **The Barn** and **The House** primarily serve people of all religious affiliations in Maryland's Mid-Shore counties of Caroline, Kent, Queen

Anne's, and Talbot. Secondarily, Dorchester, lower Delaware, and other Maryland counties are given limited assistance.

My volunteer work with the ministry for the past six years has included packaging and distributing food, preparing Christmas gifts for adopted families, and delivering trunk loads of donations of clothes and household goods from the generous homeowners in Symphony Village. I am completing my sixth year as a board member for the ministries and continue to serve on a fund raising committee that sponsors an annual Authors' Luncheon on the first Saturday in March at the Chesapeake Bay Beach Club. Several of our homeowners have attended the Authors' Luncheon (the next one is Saturday, March 1), which includes book presentations by the authors, signed book sales, a silent auction, raffle, complimentary wine, soda, and lunch. If interested, you may purchase a ticket from Dorothy Hamm or me.

St. Martin's Mission statement is: "To help meet the basic human needs of impoverished people, to respect and affirm their dignity, and to address the root problems that perpetuate the cycle of poverty." MUSHROOM MINI-MUFFINS

From the kitchen of Carol Hodges



½ cup, plus 3 T butter, divided

1 cup finely chopped sweet
or Vidalia onion

1 pound portabella mushroom caps,
finely chopped

¾ cup shredded mozzarella cheese

¼ cup shredded Swiss cheese

½ cup finely chopped flat-leaf parsley

2 egg yolks, beaten

1 tsp. sea salt

2 tsp. Italian seasoning

8 slices wheat bread

1. Preheat oven to 350 F.
2. Melt 3 T butter in a large skillet over medium heat, add onions and mushrooms, and sauté 6 minutes or until softened. Remove from heat. Stir in cheeses, parsley, egg yolks, salt, and Italian seasoning.
3. Melt ½ cup butter in a small saucepan. With a rolling pin, flatten each slice of bread and cut into four squares. Dip each square into melted butter and place in a mini-muffin cup. Top each with a tablespoon of mushroom mixture. Bake 20 to 25 minutes or until lightly browned. Serve warm. Garnish with extra cheese if desired. Serves 10 to 12.

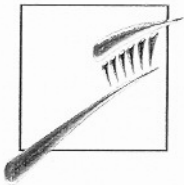


