

NEWS FROM JACK DEDRICK

RE: Use of wheelchairs and golf carts on public roadways and sidewalks (including SV). I had a meeting with Centreville Police Chief Joseph (Dino) Pignataro on January 24 concerning use of wheelchairs and golf carts on public roads. He gave me information that explains the Maryland laws governing use of these vehicles. Here is a summary of our discussion:

Wheelchairs, standard or electric, are allowed on sidewalks where provided. If there is no sidewalk you must travel on the left side of the roadway facing on-coming traffic.

Golf carts are **NOT allowed** on sidewalks or roadways that are open to the public within the state, except as authorized on Smith Island. Off-road vehicles such as ATV's and Golf carts do not meet safety equipment requirements for registration; therefore, they CANNOT be lawfully driven on the roads and highways. Possible fines include \$280 plus other violations for lack of equipment, etc., and failure to obey a traffic device--\$90/\$130 if a collision is caused.

CYCLING CLUB ORGANIZATIONAL MEETING



CRUISE CONTROL

A woman had an accident several weeks ago and totaled her car. It was raining, though not excessively, when her car suddenly began to hydro-plane and literally flew through the air. She was not seriously injured but, of course, was stunned at the sudden occurrence. When the woman explained what had

happened to the police officer at the scene, he told her something that every driver should know. NEVER drive in the rain or snow with the cruise control on. This woman thought she was being cautious by setting the cruise control and maintaining a safe, consistent speed in the rain. The policeman told her that, if the cruise control is on when a car begins to hydro-plane, the tires lose contact with the pavement, and the cruise control will cause the car to accelerate to a higher rate of speed. When the tires touch ground again, the driver is likely to lose control.

This warning should be listed on the sun visors along with the airbag warning, but it isn't. Some vehicles will not allow you to set the cruise control when the windshield wipers are on. Let all your friends and family know – you might save someone's life.

911 FLASHING SECURITY LIGHT

RECIPE


From the kitchen of Kathy Gauthier Molten Chocolate Cakes

Makes 8 Servings (1/2 cake each serving)

4 squares semi-sweet baking chocolate ¹/₂ cup butter 1 cup powdered sugar 2 eggs, plus 2 egg yolks 6 Tbsp. flour Cool Whip for topping **Preheat** oven to 425 degrees. Butter 4 (6 oz.) custard cups or soufflé dishes and place on baking sheet. **Microwave** 4 squares chocolate and ½ cup butter in large microwavable bowl on HIGH until butter is melted. Stir with wire whisk until chocolate is completely melted. Stir in powdered sugar until well blended. Whisk in eggs and yolks, stir in flour until well blended. Divide batter among the 4 custard cups.

Bake 13 to 14 minutes, or until sides are firm but centers are soft. Let stand 1 minute. Run small knife around cakes to loosen. Invert cakes onto dessert dishes. Divide each cake in half (or leave whole for real chocoholics). Serve immediately, topped with Cool Whip.

Batter can be made the day before. Pour into prepared custard cups, cover with plastic wrap and refrigerate. When ready to serve, uncover and bake as directed.




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
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
