One of these people is John Schultz, Webmaster for the SV Residents' Website.* When John and his wife, Helen, moved to SV in 2005, he heard there was a need for someone to set up and maintain a website for our community. VOLUNTEER OPPORTUNITIES

Crossroads Community, Inc.

Crossroads is a non-profit mental health agency serving children and adults in the five mid-shore counties. Its mission is to teach skills and to access resources that empower people with mental health needs to live satisfying and productive lives. Crossroads promotes community acceptance through advocacy and community education. While the staff at Crossroads uses a person-centered recovery model, volunteers are trained to complement the psychiatric rehabilitation services by being friends.

Volunteer opportunities vary widely. The formal one-on-one program matching community volunteers in supportive friendships with adults is in its development stages. Other meaningful volunteer connections with Crossroads include assistance with fundraising events and light administrative duties. American Cancer Society: Road to Recovery Program

The American Cancer Society needs volunteer drivers to participate in its Road to Recovery program. Road to Recovery volunteers drive cancer patients to and from hospitals and doctors' offices where they receive lifesaving treatment. The lack of transportation has become a major problem for thousands of cancer patients. Many need daily or weekly treatment, often over the course of several months. Increasingly, these treatments are provided on an outpatient basis, which means that the patient must have a way to get to the appointment. Many patients have no car or are simply too ill to drive. Family and friends may help, but they may not have the time or financial means to assume the total burden of frequent trips to treatment centers. To become a Road to Recovery volunteer you must own a car, have a safe driving record, and have a few spare hours per month. If you meet these criteria, call the American Cancer Society at 1-800-ACS-2345 to find out how to become a Road to Recovery volunteer.

Perhaps all the stars were in alignment, or maybe they were just there at the right place and the right time, but David and Valerie Heisler of 254 Concerto Avenue have decided to take the chance of a lifetime and run a bed-and-breakfast in Vermont. "The opportunity just fell into our laps," Valerie said. The Heislers weren't looking to make a change, but when they visited the tiny village of Jamaica, Vermont, last spring on their first trip to their daughter's new ski/vacation home, they fell in love with the area.



The Heislers are native New Yorkers, and three of their children still live in the New York/New Jersey metropolitan area. Spring has finally arrived, although we are still looking for warm weather. The crocuses came early, as expected, and the daffodils are in full bloom. The first meeting of the year will be held on Saturday, April 19, in the Gazebo (weather permitting). Our tulips did not prosper, and Breck has been contacted to see if we can get a deal on replacing the 700 bulbs we planted last spring.

The purple martin house has been cleaned and opened for business. The martins are expected in mid-May. A request for approval to install a second martin house at the end of the eastern pond (off Encore) has been submitted. Garden Club members will install the new house, but donations will be solicited to cover the cost of about \$200.

Can You Spare Some Parsley?

If you love butterflies and you grow a pot of parsley (or dill or any member of the carrot



family) on your patio or deck, then you can see the entire life cycle of the Eastern Black Swallowtail here in SV. In late spring, adult black swallowtails will begin laying single eggs on the parsley – the eggs are very small and cream-colored. After 4-8 days (depending on the weather), the egg turns black and looks like a tiny bird dropping (to divert predators). The first caterpillar you'll see is black, very small, with a tiny white stripe around its middle. They quickly grow as they

feast on your parsley. The caterpillar grows to about a half inch and then molts for the first time. The caterpillar's colors and markings change with each of several molts. The caterpillar becomes apple green with black stripes and vivid yellow spots, eventually growing to about two inches. When the time is right, they leave your parsley and find a place to spin a cocoon and form a chrysalis (colored green or brown depending on the location chosen) whose surface soon hardens. Metamorphosis begins; when complete in several weeks, the chrysalis splits open and the adult butterfly emerges to dry its wings and fly off. The cycle is complete. There are two or three broods per season, so you may see caterpillars on your parsley as late as September. The chrysalises from the last brood go into a type of hibernation that carries that generation through the winter to complete metamorphosis in spring and begin the cycle yet again. If you choose to host this butterfly, <u>your</u> harvest will be diminished, but think of the beauty you'll be sending into the world.

P.S. The Flower Mart now underway offers both parsley and dill.

Symphony Village Bird Club

The Bird Club went in two groups to the Eagle Festival at Blackwater National Wildlife



Refuge in March. Both groups took a guided Eagle Prowl to look specifically for bald eagles – neither group was disappointed. Along with lots of eagles "on the wing," the first group saw two majestic eagles sitting in the treetops along the river. Both groups observed a mama (or papa) dutifully sitting on their nest as its mate soared in the sky overhead. The second group thrilled to watch two osprey repeatedly chase and dive bomb a bald eagle in a dispute over

something (food? territory? nesting site?), and they watched through a spotting scope as an eagle sat on the shoreline eating a fish. We saw a group of white pelicans which are rare in this area. Blackwater exhibits included owls, birds of prey, a turkey vulture, a gyrfalcon, and a peregrine falcon. As we motored in the tour vans along the impoundments, we saw lots of turtles sunning themselves in piled up groups on the mud edges. It was a wonderful outing.



What to do if credit cards are stolen!

Advice on credit card fraud prevention is making the rounds again:

1. We have been told we should cancel our credit cards immediately. The key is having the toll free numbers and your card numbers handy so you know whom to call. Keep those where you can find them. You should make photocopies of both sides of all credit cards.

2. File a police report immediately in the jurisdiction where your credit cards, etc., were stolen. This proves to credit providers you were diligent, and this is a first step toward an investigation (if there ever is one).

3. While most of the advice has been heard before, you may not have heard to call the three national credit reporting organizations immediately to place a fraud alert on your name and Social Security Number. The numbers are as follows-- Equifax: 1-800-525-6285; Experian (formerly TRW): 1-888-397-3742; TransUnion: 1-800-680-7289; and Social Security Administration (fraud line): 1-800-269-0271.

MOCHA CHOCOLATE TRIFLE From the Kitchen of Millie Guerrieri



1 (18.25 ounce) package devil's food 1¹/₃ cups water cake mix 2 Tbsp. vegetable oil 3 large eggs Cooking spray 2 cups cold milk 1 (3.9 ounce) package chocolate instant $\frac{1}{2}$ cup Kahlúa (coffee-flavored liqueur) or $\frac{1}{2}$ pudding mix cup strong brewed coffee 1 (12 ounce) carton frozen light whipped ¹/₂ cup chopped Hershey's Large Symphony topping, thawed Bar with Roasted Almonds and Toffee Chips

- ✓ Preheat oven to 350°.
- ✓ Combine first 5 ingredients in a large bowl; beat at medium speed of a mixer until well blended.
- \checkmark Spoon batter into a 13x9-inch baking pan coated with cooking spray.
- ✓ Bake at 350° for 25 minutes or until a wooden pick inserted in center comes out clean.
- ✓ Cool in pan 10 minutes on a wire rack; remove from pan. Cool completely on a wire rack.
- ✓ Combine milk and pudding mix in a medium bowl; prepare according to package directions.
- ✓ Tear half of cake into pieces; place in a 3-quart bowl or trifle dish.
- ✓ Pour half of Kahlúa, pudding, whipped topping, and chocolate bars onto cake.
- \checkmark Repeat layers.
- \checkmark Cover; chill at least 5 hours.
- ✓ Yield: 16 servings (serving size: about 1 cup).

The dessert can be made the night before except for the last layer which can be added the day of serving. To keep it from sticking, add toothpicks to the top before covering with plastic wrap.

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
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
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
