We then adjourned to Mary and George Drake's patio where we peeked into their bluebird house to gaze at four babies just over a week old. ## GAZEIBD and VEGETARLE GARDEN CLUBS

The Gazebo Garden was in even better shape for the Fourth of July than it was for Memorial Day. Thanks to all the gardeners for their hard work. Several residents have expressed their pleasure at sitting in the Gazebo, enjoying the flowers, and watching the flying antics of the purple martins. If you were lucky, you may have observed the parent martins pushing off their young for their first flight. In fact, the second brood of martins has hatched and is ready for its flight instructions. We have enjoyed the purple martins and will miss them when they leave for South America around August 15. Next season we will install another martin house. As reported last month, the killdeer have returned to the garden. They laid four eggs, three of which have hatched. However, only two baby killdeer have been observed running around the flower beds. Possibly, one of the feral cats in the neighborhood captured the third. Also, despite our best efforts, a pair of robins nested inside the Gazebo. After the robins hatched, we removed the nest and cleaned up the mess they left. Twenty sweet potatoes and four dragon-wing begonias were planted in the pavilion garden and are thriving nicely. herbs are also growing in our Gazebo Garden and are available for residents. For harvesting herbs, please contact Joan Hennessey (410-758-4872).

Despite the lack of rain, our Vegetable Garden is off to a booming and blooming start, thanks to the water supplied by Diane Briggs. Our early crops are done and replaced by the hot summer crops. Numerous zucchini and squash have been harvested and distributed to lucky neighbors. The tomatoes are just starting to ripen. There are 72 tomato plants in the 10 beds, so the harvest should be great. There are numerous rabbits in the garden and everywhere in the Village. They are getting fat eating our plants. Hopefully, some lucky hunter will provide us with hasenpfeffer in the fall.-Jack Hennessey

## READING FOR FUN BOOK CLUR

## RESTAURANT REVIEW

Doc's Riverside Grille

Look east, west, north, or south of us, and there is no place like Doc's. Leave SV, turn right on Route 213 and go northwest! Bo and Diane Oristian opened this charming restaurant in July 2006; and ever since Doc's Riverside Grill has served the community with generous portions, reasonable prices, and excellent service. A lively bar and grill area and a small, yet warm dining room received the award of "Best Place to Take Family" by Best of Annapolis \& Eastern Shore magazine in 2009.

We have never been disappointed since discovering Doc's a couple of years ago. Some of our recent favorites are the Prime Rib and the Surf and Turf Burger. However, the Rack of Ribs, Lobster Ravioli, and Tuna BLT are also stellar. Doc's offers so much for so many as there are at least 24 starters on the menu. Do try the Seafood Nachos, a delightful mix of shrimp, scallops, and crab over corn chips with Philly cheddar cheese and seafood sauce. Also, the Beer Battered Rockfish Tenders with Doc's homemade chips and dipping sauce never disappoints. Oh! Don't forget to try the soups, such as Cream of Crab and Cachow's Maryland Seafood which is vegetable based with assorted seafood and very delicious!

Some standouts from prior visits to Doc's are the Oriental Salad with grilled teriyaki chicken breast, mandarin orange, walnuts, and fried noodles over mixed greens and served with Asian ginger dressing. You can order half or whole. There are also Taco, Cobb, Spinach, and West Coast salads with grilled chicken, walnuts, and a variety of tropical fruit to choose from. The Grilled Tuna, the Macadamia and Coconut Encrusted Mahi Mahi, and Doc's Shrimp Chesapeake are wonderful dishes to try. Wow, the burgers at Doc's truly are the best! There's the Black and Blue Burger seared in Cajun spices and topped with spicy bacon and crumbled blue cheese. Don't forget the South of the Border or the Big "O" Burger with Crab Topping. These entrees can be followed with a fresh (tart and scrumptious) slice of Key Lime Pie for dessert.

Don't forget to check online or call for the prices and specials: Monday's special is Sirloin Steak; Tuesday features the half-price Doc's Burger Plate; Wednesday is Prime Rib Night; and Thursday is Karaoke Night. Friday and Saturday feature a D.J. and dancing, and Sunday features wide-screen sports. Newcomers, you are in for quite a treat at Doc's Riverside Grille, close by and homey!

## COMPUTER TIP

Have you ever created an important letter, recipe, photo, or record of your finances and then LOST them due to a power outage or surge, a virus, or something else? If so (and even if not so, it will inevitably happen) then you need to know how to make a backup (copy) of that document for safekeeping-or give your document to someone else. Here's some good advice.


## FILE BACKUP MUST BE TIMELY

You can normally repair or replace a damaged operating program by reinstalling it; but, once the actual data produced is lost, it is gone. During normal operation of two computers over a twenty-year period, I have lost data even though I have an uninterruptable power supply and several anti-virus programs. They have shut down because of unexpected internet security program updates which required automatic computer restarts, viruses that bypassed the four separate computer virus protection programs, and hidden viruses that transferred by manual disc insertion. There are just too many ways for damage to occur to assume one hundred percent protection.

Document and program backup is an excellent way to ensure safety to your document and programs. It is relatively easy but can be time consuming. The size of the hard drive[s], the speed of the computer, and the data backup method are all factors. Create a backup drive (such as a drive "E") if your computer allows for partitioning of the hard drive[s]. Transfer your important files to that drive as necessary, but at least at the end of your computer use day before you turn the system off. If you cannot use a hard drive, backup to DVD or CD disc. You can also subscribe to internet-based backup services which will automatically backup your changed data once a day.
To backup to your hard drive, create a folder on your hard drive where you will store your backup documents. Depending on your installed operating program, either copy and paste or transfer the backup data to the allocated folder. If your operating program allows, let the computer automatically do this on a pre-selected schedule. If not, accomplish this task manually.
DVD and CD Recordable and Re-Writable discs are available. When choosing between the two types of discs, consider the following:

- Use Recordable discs(R—Read Only) when you want to be assured that a lot of other people can read the DVD/ CD (for example, when you want to share data with others or want to store music that you can play in any home or car CD player).
- Choose Re-Writable discs (RW—Read/Write) as additional personal storage for your computer (for example, when you want to archive files to free up space on your hard drive or to transfer files between home and work and later rewrite new data to this same disc).

1 pint cherry tomatoes, halved
1 green pepper, chopped
1 red pepper, chopped
1 can black olives, halved
1 bottle Zesty Italian Dressing
Garlic salt
1 lb . Pasta-green, orange, white (for color)

*Vegetable Supreme (spice) or 1tsp. of Italian seasoning

- Cook pasta in hot water and rinse in cold water.
- Cut all vegetables and add to pasta and toss.
- Add Zesty Italian Dressing
- Add Vegetable Supreme to taste.
- Add Garlic salt to taste and toss.
- Chill.
