It was created by the residents of Symphony Village to provide volunteer service and financial support to charitable and civic organizations in Queen Anne's County. Neighbor to Neighbor and Caregivers are successful groups also within the Outreach program.

Outreach raises the money necessary to provide these services with fundraisers held throughout the year. And these fundraisers are successful because of the support of the Villagers! For that we are very grateful.

Third Annual Food Drive to Begin Soon!





Put the "Daily Bulletin" and "Calendar" on Your Desktop

Another easy way to access the **Daily Bulletin** or **Calendar**, is to place it on your **Desktop** so that you can click on it and be taken to it immediately. Follow the instructions below to accomplish this. Again, call Carol for assistance.

If you use **Windows Explorer**



- 1. Open the Symphony Village Website.
- 2. Shrink the page by clicking on the reduce button in the upper right hand corner.
- 3. Make it so that you can see both the desktop and the Website.
- 4. Click and hold on Calendar (Daily Bulletin).
- 5. Drag to your desktop and release.
- 6. You will be asked if you really want to; say **OK**.
- 7. Rename the icon on your desktop by right clicking and picking **Rename**.
- 8. Check to see that it works.



If you use **Firefox**

- 1. Repeat first 3 steps above.
- 2. Right Click on Calendar (Daily Bulletin).
- 3. Click on Save Link As.
- 4. Choose **Desktop**.
- 5. Do steps 7 and 8.

GAZEBO and **VEGETABLE** GARDEN CLUBS

While our August report was going to press, our gazebo purple martins were gathering on August 9 in a large flock. On August 10, they flew the coop. They are reportedly heading for Argentina. As of September 10, most of our hummingbirds seem to have migrated also, although a few are still around. According to the experts at Cornell Ornithology Labs, it is time to take down our hummer feeders so as not to keep the hummers hanging around too far into the cool weather.



Our Gazebo flowers are also getting ready for fall. Many of the blossoms are going to seed, and we will leave most of them for bird feed. Still there is a lot of dead-heading to do, and a few weeds to pull. We will not be putting in any tulips this fall, since we have not had much luck with them, but we will be planting a few daffodils. In late August, we did fertilize the existing daffodils. We will also be culling a few flowers that have taken over the garden, and will transplant some of the crepe myrtles that have also proliferated.

Our biggest problem is that we need a new caretaker for the Gazebo Garden, since Jack Hennessey is retiring as of December 31. If anyone is interested in taking over the job of caretaker, please contact Jack at 410-758-4872, and he will brief you on the duties. Incidentally, one of these duties is to take down and store the Gazebo Christmas Tree, which Jack and his elves will be erecting around Thanksgiving. Jack will continue to manage the Vegetable Garden in 2012. Many residents have shared in the harvest of the vegetables. The lack of rain caused many of our plants to wither on the vine. We still have some radishes, lettuce, and spinach producing; but our tomatoes, squash, and other plants were done in by the recent hurricane. We hope to have better luck (weather) next year.



VOLUNTEERS IN ACTION

Camp New Dawn Bereavement for Kids

Eve is ten years old. She speaks of the recent deaths of her mother and her best friend and then passes around a picture of her mother to other children seated in a circle. Later that day she goes to the Challenge Course and climbs up 40 feet on a ladder called the "centipede" which twists and swings as she climbs. Before climbing, Eve announces her challenge and guaranteed goals to the trainer and the other children waiting their turn. She accomplishes both.

At the remembrance campfire, Larry drops the name of his deceased grandfather into the fire after he reads his grandfather's name aloud. He returns to his seat sitting next to his adult "buddy" and sobs. His 10-year-old cabin companion leaves his seat and puts his arm around Larry saying, "That's OK; we're all sad here. Just let it out. We feel the same way. You are crying for all of us." His words repeat the message of that day's morning therapeutic session.

Angel speaks tearfully of the death of her father and passes around a picture. Later, before she goes to the Challenge Course, she sits with her 4-year-old brother at lunch making sure he eats enough. At night she sings a pop song during karaoke.

Most of the 50 campers will stay overnight in cabins as part of the Hospice of Queen Anne's Camp New Dawn bereavement program for children ages 4-17. The younger children go home in the evenings. The experiences reported above of Eve, Larry, and Angel are examples of the many experiences children have at camp. This program, in its 17th year, uses the facilities of Camp Pecometh on the Chester River just north of Centreville. Are younger children too immature to benefit from a bereavement camp? One volunteer thought so, but changed her mind after observing 6-year-old campers energetically participating in therapeutic crafts and play.

Five Symphony Village residents volunteered to assist campers and Hospice staff during the two-day camp. Andy Cowley and Jack Walsh were "buddies" to two 10-year-old boys, staying overnight with them. Not all adult volunteers stay overnight. Karin Larsen was a "buddy" to a 6-year-old girl during the day and spent the night with her as well as another girl because that girl's adult "buddy" didn't stay overnight. Glorya Cowley has been coordinator of the 4-7-year old camp for the past three years. Tom Baker was the Executive Assistant to the Camp Director, Rhonda Knotts, as well as her Master Sergeant. (When she needed something done, Tom got someone to do it.) Andy has volunteered for 13 years. This was Jack and Karin's first year.

Adult buddies attend six hours of training to prepare them for interacting with the children assigned to them. The training stresses that counseling is not a buddy's role. Rather, you accompany a child

to four therapeutic sessions which are conducted by trained counselors. In addition, if you are able to stay at night, you supervise overnight campers.

During the day, you support trained staff with camp activities such as swimming, boating, crafts, and campfires.

Ask any of the volunteers, and they will tell you that, yes, camp New Dawn is an intense experience, exposing one to the sorrow of children. But each one also would agree with Ms. Knotts who says that Hospice of Queen Anne's "offers children an opportunity to learn about and express grief in a safe, natural environment and the chance to gain coping skills and a place to take a step toward preventing unresolved grief problems later in life." Each volunteer would add that being close



to a child who takes that step is joyful and inspiring. Speak to one of the volunteers. Perhaps you'll want to volunteer next year. Stay overnight or just come during the day. Whatever you choose, help is needed and your assistance will be greatly appreciated.

This year's two-day camp ended with a balloon launch symbolizing the camp goal: **"The Lifting of Spirits."** When Eve, Larry, and Angel released their balloons, they were all smiling.

RESTAURANT REVIEW Kitty Knight House Restaurant

Just a 40-minute drive from Symphony Village in Georgetown on the hill overlooking the Sassafras River is a well kept secret, <u>Kitty Knight House</u>. Larry and I celebrated our anniversary there with two other couples and had a very delicious meal.

The décor of the dining room includes attractive colors and window dressings to highlight the view of the river. There is seating on the deck, weather permitting. Service was excellent.

There is a different special daily. We took advantage of the "Thursday 60s Night - Half Price Entrees." (All entrees are ½ price for those 60 and older.) I truly loved my Cashew Crusted **Salmon**—pan seared, topped with jumbo shrimp in a teriyaki-fresh ginger glaze, served with stirfry vegetables and rice pilaf. The taste lingered for a long time after the meal. My husband and two friends truly enjoyed the Broiled Seafood Combo—crab cake, salmon, shrimp, lobster and scallops topped with a fresh herb butter sauce, served with oven roasted potatoes and fresh vegetable medley. The potatoes included an assortment of different varieties of potatoes



including a blue potato. The other two meals were the daily special of Soft-shell Crabs and Fillet **Mignon.** None of us were hungry enough to sample the appetizers, soups, salads, or dessert. Guess we have to go back.

The winter hours until October are Monday through Friday from 4 p.m. to 9 p.m., Saturday from 11 a.m. to 10 p.m., Sunday Brunch at 10 a.m. After that, they will be closed on Monday and Tuesday and will be closing an hour earlier. History buffs will enjoy the stories of the past.

RECIPE

Quick Shrimp Soufflé for Brunch

From the Kitchen of Karin Anne Larsen

8 eggs

¹/₄ cup chopped onion, or 2 tablespoons dried onion flakes 8 ounces cooked shrimp, cut in small pieces 2 tomatoes cut into 8 pieces each

1 cup sliced canned mushrooms, drained well

Ground salt and pepper to taste

Beat eggs with onions and stir in shrimp.

Pour into 13" x 9" x 2" baking dish.

Arrange sliced mushrooms over the top of the mixture.

Place tomato slices artfully on top.

Bake at 400 degrees for 30-40 minutes and let stand 5 minutes to set.



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
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
