BIRD CLUB



The Bird Club traveled to Pickering Creek Audubon Center on September 25 for the first "Walk 'n Talk" of the season entitled "Hawks." After discussing the most common hawks in our area (red-tailed, red-shouldered, Cooper's, and sharp-shinned) as well as the colorful kestrel, we walked to the freshwater wetlands overlook. Birding definitely started slowly – along the path we saw lots of butterflies (buckeyes, monarchs, a clouded sulfur, a silver spotted skipper, and a tiny orange and black butterfly

about the size of a nickel) and dragonflies galore. We even noted bright orange milkweed bugs on the milkweed – the bugs help split open the mature seed pods so the seeds may be dispersed by the wind. Once on the viewing platform, we scanned the sky for several minutes before sighting some turkey and black vultures soaring over the treetops in the distance. But patience did pay off. We eventually saw a yellowthroat who seemed as interested in us as we were in her! Also spotted were a bald eagle, a juvenile bald eagle, barn swallows (who, our guide told us, should have migrated by now), a yellow-shafted flicker, a mockingbird, American crows, and a flock of chimney swifts ("little cigars with wings"). A walk along the freshwater pond yielded no bird sightings, but a painted turtle was resting on top of hurricane debris, apparently hoping that the sun would make an appearance (it didn't). We only spotted one hawk on our walk – either a Cooper's or a sharp-shinned – too far away to positively identify. GAZEBO and VEGETABLE GARDEN CLUBS




Our garden activities have been pretty much limited to weeding and deadheading, although several residents have been harvesting herbs from our two herb beds. Most flowers have gone to seed, and we are letting them stand to provide feed for the birds. A few daffodils have been planted for spring blooming. It is our goal to have one caretaker for each of the twenty beds in the Gazebo Garden. Each of the current caretakers has been contacted to see if they will continue their support in 2012. For various reasons, several residents will not be able to participate, so we have only thirteen volunteers signed up for 2012. There will be a meeting in the Clubhouse on Thursday, October 27, at 7 p.m. to make plans for next year. All residents are invited to attend. We hope to sign up seven new volunteers. Our primary goal at the meeting is to have one person agree to act as the chief gardener. A list of the duties of that position will be presented at the meeting.

As for the Veggie Garden, we have obtained permission to use the plot for another year from the new tenant farmer, but with a smaller area. Unfortunately, this means fewer farmers. We will work out the details at a winter meeting. We continue to harvest flowers, lettuce, and many eggplants, and we are looking forward to next year!


<u>ALL-YOU-CAN-EAT BULL AND OYSTER ROAST</u>



RESTAURANT REVIEW

4 Seasons Bistro

Eight Symphony Village Singles dined at the 4 Seasons Bistro last month, a restaurant in Chester which advertises both American and Mediterranean cuisine. We were seated at a long table which accommodated eight people comfortably. Everyone ordered from an extensive menu offering a wide variety of food. One of our party decided to have an appetizer and dessert for her meal—the appetizer was Shrimp Coconut, and I was told it was very tasty. Another of our party ordered mignon flatbread and cream of crab soup. The soup was declared delicious and the flatbread was filet mignon,

caramelized onions, pine nuts, mushrooms, and gorgonzola cheese. The serving was more than ample and half was taken home. Another person ordered Orange Roughy Imperial, a fish filet with crab imperial, baked potato, and mixed vegetables.

I ordered Rockfish Mare Chiara, pan-seared fish with PEI mussels in marinara sauce on angel hair pasta, and I can report that this dish was delicious. The mussels were especially good, but it could be made with any fish. It had a wonderful flavor. Another diner ordered Veal Chesapeake-a veal dish with wild mushrooms, creamy rosé sauce, and crabmeat on angel hair pasta. This diner commented she had eaten it before in other restaurants, and this dish definitely lived up to her expectations. It was tasty with a good amount of crab in the sauce. The sixth single had Mare Monte, a combination of chicken, veal, shrimp, artichoke hearts, asparagus tips, roasted peppers, and lemon buerre blanc sauce on angel hair pasta. She had eaten this selection before and enjoyed it enough to order it again. The remaining two singles ordered Lettuce Wedge BLT salad, which included smoked Gouda cheese and gorgonzola dressing. They split this salad and ate it before their meal. The entrée they ordered was All Wheat Veggie Lovers with shrimp, light marinara sauce, goat cheese, and whole wheat pasta. They reportedly enjoyed this and again the portion was ample enough that some was brought home. Four of the singles had dessert: two had crème brûlée which they enjoyed, and two shared a plate of two cannolis. They said they were delicious. Service was good. However, the waitress had difficulty obliging our request for separate checks causing an extra wait.

The menu prices are reasonable. Appetizers are listed at \$8-\$11, flatbread sandwiches are \$8-\$10, and main dishes are \$20-\$25. Vegetarian meals are \$13, and main dish salads are \$12-\$25. Because all of meals were especially delicious, we unanimously declared we would go back to the 4 Seasons Bistro again.

RECIPE

Eggplant Meatballs

From the kitchen of Bea Trotta

3 T. canola oil
1 garlic clove, minced
1 large eggplant, peeled and diced
1 T. water
1 c. bread crumbs
½ c. fresh parsley, chopped

1 T. basil
1/8 tsp. pepper, optional
2 eggs, beaten
½ c. grated cheese
marinara sauce
grated mozzarella

- In large saucepan, heat oil and gently sauté garlic until golden. Add diced eggplant, water, and cover. Reduce heat. Steam until eggplant is very soft.
- In a mixing bowl combine eggplant, bread crumbs, parsley, basil, pepper, eggs, and grated cheese. Mix well. Refrigerate for 20 minutes. Remove from refrigerator and form into balls.
- Place meatballs on a greased pan and bake them at 325° F for 35 minutes. (If you prefer, you can fry the meatballs in frying oil.)
- Garnish with marinara sauce and grated mozzarella and bake for an additional 5 minutes to melt mozzarella. The meatballs can also be served with your favorite pasta and sauce. Serves 4—6.
