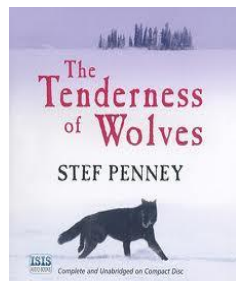
So far no one has volunteered to take over the job of Chief Gardener. If no one comes forward, the Caruso staff will have to come up with a plan.

### READING FOR FUN BOOK CLUB

The Book Club met in the Clubhouse to discuss the book *The Color of Water* by James McBride. The story revolves around a white Jewish mother, her two black husbands (successively), and her 12 children, all of whom graduated from college. She is indeed an amazing woman! The book, which was selected by Ellen Reid, received a rating of 8.3 on a scale of 1 to 10. This is the third highest rating for any book read by the Book Club! Ellen provided delicious black and white cream puffs along with soft drinks for dessert.



At our next meeting on November 15, we will be discussing the book *The Tenderness of Wolves*, by Stef Penney. The story is set in 1867, in the Northern Territory. A trapper is brutally murdered. Many of the local residents try to follow the tracks left by the killer into the freezing northern wilderness. They also try to find two sisters who have been missing for 17 years. The author weaves adventure, suspense, and humor into an exhilarating thriller!

The library group of the Book Club is attempting to integrate four new boxes of books stored in the Hennessey garage into the limited library space. Jack met with committee members Arlyn Marshall

and Alan Ettman, who recommended that we have a book giveaway in order to create space for newer books. In accordance with this recommendation, we will be culling some of the older books for giveaway. These books will be placed on the counter in the Craft Room the week of November 14 where any resident may take them. After two weeks, any books remaining will be donated to the Wye Church Book Fair. (Our county library does not want them.) Any resident wishing to donate books to our library should leave them at the front desk. They will be stored in Jack's garage until they can be integrated into the system.

In December, a copy of all books on hand that have been read by the Book Club will be placed in a separate section of the library. A list of all books read by the Book Club, with their ratings, will be available for reference. All books with a rating of 7.0 and higher are "Recommended Reading."

## **VOLUNTEERS IN ACTION**

### **Life on the Sidelines with the “QACHS Chain Gang”**

The Queen Anne's County High School Chain Gang, organized by Dave Peterson, has just completed its third successful season assisting the officiating crew on the sidelines. The Chain Gang operates the “chains” and down marker at all Freshman, Junior Varsity, and Varsity QACHS football games. This enables parents of the players to watch their children play and not have to be recruited to work at the games. Chain crews are an important, if overlooked, component of high school football. Occasionally, the gang is called to bring the chains to the middle of the field for crucial first-down measurements. Chain crew members are also in an awkward position. They work on the visiting team's sideline, right in the midst of the opposing teams' players and coaches, so rooting is not allowed. However, from time to time you can see a grin or small fist pump when the QACHS Lions make a big play. Until this year, the Lions varsity team had not lost a single game when the Chain Gang was present. The Board of Education even honored the Chain Gang at a recent honors ceremony. Carol Williamson, Superintendent of Queen Anne's County Schools, presented “Rising Star” certificates to each Chain Gang member. Also, at the year-end Chain Gang Potluck Supper, QACHS Assistant Athletic Director John Haines thanked the gang and said that their work had lifted the high school's football program to the next level in professionalism. While that may be true, the Chain Gang members enjoy the work so much (even in the rain) that they are already looking forward to the 2012 QACHS football season.

Two of these SV residents, Marilyn Williams and Lloyd McAtee, have been volunteering since this program began in 2006, and they also help with volunteer scheduling. The other current operators are John DiLaura, George Hughes, Doris Pullman, and Mary and Tom Scull. Dennis Sesplankis is a certified PSO and is responsible for pool testing during his work week. All PSOs had to attend a two-day training program and pass a test in order to receive their Queen Anne's County PSO certification. Taking care of the indoor and outdoor pools and spa is no small task. Simply put, it requires taking readings three times each day to ensure the proper pool

chemistry, opening and closing the gates to the outdoor pool during summer months, and making sure ALL the sliding-glass doors to the indoor pool/spa area are closed and locked each evening.

**The PSOs certainly deserve a big “THANK YOU” for the work they do to keep the indoor and outdoor pools and spa working properly and safely.**

**Note:** Currently, we have a waiting list of prospective SV PSOs; but the person in charge of the certification program has been unable to schedule a training program in over a year.

### File of Life - 'Cause You Never Know . . .

Recently a neighbor needed to be taken to the hospital by ambulance. Before the unit could leave his house, however, an EMT had to obtain some basic information – his doctor's name, a list of existing medical conditions, and, most importantly, a list of his medications – including dosages. In the emotional swirl of the situation, it was difficult to remember all of this information. **How much easier it would have been had he had a “File of Life” on the side of his refrigerator.**

A “File of Life” is a form that lists your emergency contacts, medical data (medications, blood type, etc.), medical conditions, allergies, and medical insurance information. Once the form is completed, you slip it into its red plastic magnet holder and put it on the side of your refrigerator. Emergency personnel are trained to look for the files there. If you have one, the first responders

simply take it with you to the hospital because it provides the background information that medical personnel need to begin caring for you quickly. In an emergency situation, this is critical!

Fortunately, everyone in the Village can obtain a **free** "File of Life" from **George Drake**, 410-758-8266. Get a file for each person in your household from George and fill them out. You also might want to consider making a few extra copies of the insert. Put one in your car's glove compartment for each person in your home. If you're a traveler, perhaps put one in your carry-on luggage.

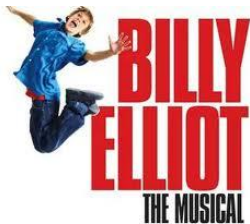

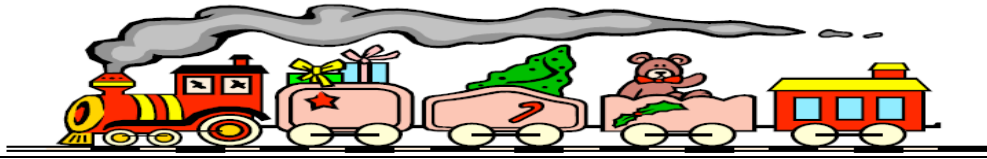

## **RESTAURANT REVIEW**

### ***Carmine's NY Pizza Kitchen***

What happened to Squisito's, a popular Restaurant on Kent Island for more than a decade? Carmine's N.Y. Pizza Kitchen happened. Emerging a year ago, this new restaurant incorporates the delicious food of Squisito's and expands the authentic tastes of Italy even further. The "incorporator" and owner is Genaro Dibenedetto, originally from Monte di Procida, Italy, which is about ten miles west of Naples. Mr. Dibenedetto is a former owner of Squisito's which opened in 1998 and was popular on Kent Island for more than a decade. A talented cook, he designed this new menu, and did you know that he helped design the menu of another popular restaurant, Four Seasons? Carmine's has gotten an interior makeover, exuding a "fresh baked and warm" kitchen atmosphere. Is this coincidental, since the word carmine means pigment of bright red color or a strong to vivid red? In a sensory way, this is how Carmine's makes me feel when sampling their rich sauces and pastas. Because of the consistently fresh and delicious food, you will really enjoy eating here.

The Dinner menu, served from 4 p.m. until closing, offers 13 different appetizers ranging from \$3.99 to \$8.99. Try the ***Toasted Ravioli*** or ***Mussels Fra Diavola*** and taste fresh mussels sautéed in spicy marinara sauce with garlic crostini, or ***Carmine's Sampler*** which consists of bruschetta, fried calamari, toasted ravioli, and jalapeño poppers. Don't forget to sample the four different types of wings. You can have ***Sweet BBQ***, ***Chesapeake***, ***Parmesan Garlic*** or ***Buffalo***. But if you just want a delicious soup, there are four to try. A favorite of mine is ***Italian Wedding***. Carmine's lets you choose from nine different delicious salads ranging from \$4.50 to \$7.99. You may like my favorite ***Sinatra Salmon Salad*** consisting of field greens, red roasted peppers, pineapple, chunks of cranberry sauce, gorgonzola, French fries, balsamic vinaigrette, and fresh broiled salmon filet.

Let's not stop now. There are 17 different Bella Pasta dishes. One favorite is the ***Salsiccia Florentine*** consisting of Italian sausage, spinach, red peppers, marinara sauce, and penne pasta for \$9.99. Or try one of over 14 fresh hand-tossed 14" to 16" pizzas ranging from \$10.99 to \$16.99.

Maybe your taste is more aligned with the eight different ***Classico Italiano*** dishes served with angel hair pasta. 
