## $3^{\text {rd }}$ Annual Artisan's Fair



Outreach has broadened the focus of its fall fundraiser to include all work by all artisans. The $3^{\text {rd }}$ Annual Artisan's Fair will take place on
Saturday, September 22, 9 a.m. -2 p.m., in the Clubhouse Ballroom. The Fair will again be open to the public and will be widely publicized.

Table rental space fees:
$\$ 25$ per card table (maximum 34" x 34 ") space
$\$ 40$ per large table ( $6^{\prime} \times 30^{\prime \prime}$ ) space
$\$ 40$ per free-standing display used in lieu of a $6^{\prime}$ table
(with the same footprint as $6^{\prime} \times 30^{\prime \prime}$ table)
$\$ 5$ for each additional free-standing door, rack, display case, etc., that will be used in addition to the table(s) space

Box lunches will be available for purchase. There will not be a bake sale this year, but Outreach will be asking SV residents to help with cookies and brownies to be included in the box lunch.

If you would like to participate in the Artisan's Fair, registration forms are at the Clubhouse near the front desk. There is a maximum of 20 artisans this year. Your spot is only guaranteed when a completed registration form and payment are received by Outreach. Almost half of the 20 spaces have been spoken for, so if you are going to participate, time is of the essence in getting your registration in. Additional information will be emailed to participants upon registration.

If you will not be participating as an artisan at this year's Fair, we hope you will save the date and plan to attend. There will be some returning artisans, as well as first-timers. It should be a good mixture of crafts and mediums.

Outreach selected Chesapeake Victories, Inc., to be the beneficiary of the Fair. Chesapeake Victories is a 501 (c) 3 non-profit organization in Church Hill that provides informational and educational support and a therapeutic riding program for neurodevelopmentally challenged children. A representative from Chesapeake Victories came to speak at the May Outreach meeting, and the committee thinks that it is a very worthy beneficiary.

## Homeowners Windows

A technical representative visited their homes in late March to determine if any windows were covered under the warranty. Some 50 plus windows have been replaced by the manufacturer under the warranty. The major issue was that the seals had failed and that there was cloudiness and or moisture between the window panes. As a result of the tech rep's visit, it was learned that any window that has been tinted automatically has the warranty voided. ## FISHERMAN'S INN RESTAURANT

Fisherman's Inn is one of the oldest and largest restaurants at Kent Narrows in Grasonville with its roots dating back to 1930, when Betty Schulz's parents opened a small restaurant in their home. Betty's father owned an oyster shucking and crab picking business at a time when there were oyster shanties and packing houses up and down the
 Kent Narrows. Prominent in its location and filled with family history, Sonny Schulz and his three sons, Andy, Jody, and Tracy are continuing the tradition, operating Fisherman's Inn Restaurant, Fisherman's Crab Deck, and Fisherman's Seafood Market. The walls of the Inn are lined with antique oyster plates dating back to the 1700 s . The bar is boat shaped and resembles the Maverick, the vessel Sonny Schulz operated for years clamming, oystering, and running fishing parties. While dining at Fisherman's, a miniature train chugs around a track suspended from the ceiling. What's not to like, with the backdrop of the Kent Narrows, fabulous food and service, and lots of authentic Eastern Shore
 atmosphere?

Speaking of dining, here are some recommendations. First course, try New Soft Shell Crab and Green Tomato. This large sautéed soft crab layered with fried green tomatoes and country ham and creamed gravy is delicious. So is the Shellfish Steam Pot comprised of littleneck clams, mussels, and shrimp steamed in white wine garlic and herb broth. Garlic cheese toast helps to sop up the broth. All soups are made fresh daily and both the Maryland Style Red Crab Soup and Chesapeake Bay Crème of Crab Soup are so delicious. Save room for Broiled Fisherman's Seafood Trio consisting of Twin Imperial Crab Stuffed Shrimp, Sea Scallops, and Lump Crab Cake or try Fisherman's signature dish, Baked Lump Crab Imperial. If you like beef, try Sonny's Filet Mignon, a center filet broiled to melt in your mouth and topped with gorgonzola cream and frizzled onions. Wow. I can go on and on about Fisherman's lobsters, sandwiches, and desserts but at this point, experience it yourself. Just catch a boat ride or come by car to Fisherman's Inn and enjoy a taste of Eastern Shore history.

## RECIPES

## Stir-Fried Oysters



1 tsp. finely grated lemon peel
8 oz. leeks
2 tbsp. chopped fresh cilantro $1 / 3$ cup fish bouillon
from Karin Anne Larsen's Kitchen
1 tsp. cornstarch
2 tbsp. fresh lemon juice
2 tbsp. corn oil
12 oz . firm bean curd (drained weight)

2 tbsp. light soy sauce
12 oz. shelled oysters (fresh) Shelled clams or mussels could be used instead of oysters

- Wash the leeks thoroughly, then trim, and slice in thin strips
- Cut the bean curd into bite-size pieces
- Add the leeks to the heated corn oil in a hot wok or skillet and stir -fry for about 2 minutes
- Add the bean curd and oysters to the wok and cook for 1-2 minutes
- Mix and thoroughly blend the lemon juice, cornstarch, light soy sauce, and fish bouillon together in a small bowl.
- Pour the bowl-cornstarch mixture, into the wok and cook while stirring occasionally, until the juices start to thicken.
- Transfer to serving bowls and sprinkle the cilantro and lemon peel on top.
