READING FOR FUN BOOK CLUB – *Jack Hennessey*



The Book Club met in the Clubhouse on February 19 to discuss *The Book Thief*, a novel by Markus Zusak. This book was recommended by June Silverman. Jack Hennessey led the discussion and provided cookies, candy, and coffee for dessert.

Much of the story takes place in the fictional town of Molching, Germany, between 1939 and 1943. A very interesting aspect of this novel is that the narrator of the story is Death! The heroine of the story is nine-year old Liesel Meminger, who becomes the book thief by stealing a book entitled *The Grave Diggers Handbook* at the funeral of her brother. Liesel is adopted by Hans and Rosa Huberman, and lives in the trying times of Nazi persecution of the Jews, one of whom is hidden by the Hubermans, namely, Max Vandenburg. Liesel helps Max and teaches her to read and write. The rest of the story revolves around the close relationship between the two. This book received a rating of 8.13 on a scale of 1 to 10 and is highly recommended for residents. A copy of this novel will be available in the SV Library in March.

Pat Loiacono has recommended the book *The Hotel on the Corner of Bitter and Sweet*, written by Jamie Ford. The setting for this story is in Seattle, Washington, at the beginning of WWII, when the internment of Japanese residents is taking place. This places a particular strain on the romance between a Chinese boy and a Japanese girl.

NEIGHBORHOOD NEWS

Reduce Electric Bills-Use an Alternate Supplier By Bob Offerman

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Your Delmarva electric bill consists of two parts. The first is Delmarva Power's charge for delivering electricity to your home. The second is the charge for the electricity itself. You have some control over the second part of the bill.

By default, your electricity is purchased from Delmarva at its Standard Offer Service (SOS) rate. In recent years, you have the option of purchasing your energy from an alternate supplier - often at a lower rate. These arrangements are generally based on a one or two-year contract.

There are a number of alternate suppliers and each supplier has different rates and terms. The supplier usually makes the arrangements for switchover with Delmarva, so you're not involved. There is no separate bill – everything is on your bill from Delmarva. In many cases early, cancellation fees are charged.

Rates and terms for alternate suppliers are continuously changing, so current prices are only available from the suppliers themselves. For comparison purposes, Delmarva's published SOS rates are:

10/1/2012 - 5/31/2013 \$.0871/kWh 6/1/2013 - 9/30/2013 \$.0955/kWh 10/1/2013 and beyond To be determined

If you consider an alternate supplier, be sure to understand the terms of the contract. You must also consider whether you think energy prices will rise or fall during the contract duration because in most cases you'll be locked in at a fixed price. (Get out your trusted Ouija board.) Also, after signing up, verify that the contracted rates are actually reflected in your Delmarva bill.

As an example of possible savings, I negotiated with Constellation last November for \$.0819 through December 2013. (All rates were lower than they are now.) That resulted in a 6% current savings and 14% savings this spring. Your mileage may vary.

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CENTREVILLE TOWN COUNCIL ELECTION




Candidate Forum Scheduled

The Town of Centreville will elect one new member to the Town Council on Monday, April 1. Town Council terms are three years, and four candidates will vie for the seat being vacated by Frank Ogens (who has chosen not to run for another term). The League of Women Voters will sponsor a **Candidate Forum** on

Thursday, March 21, 7 p.m., at the Board of Education Building (202 Chesterfield Avenue) in Centreville. The forum is free and open to all. The League of Women Voters provides a number of questions to the candidates in advance of the forum so that the candidates have an opportunity to consider their answers carefully. These questions often concern issues relating to the town's financial stability, the town wharf, communication between the Town Council and citizens, providing for the

needs of all Centreville citizens, and the candidates' vision for Centreville's future. All four candidates will be given the opportunity to answer the League's questions. The floor will then be open to the audience to ask their questions of the candidates.







RECIPE OF THE MONTH

Vegetarian Vegetable Chowder

From the Kitchen of Nancie Cameron

3 Tbsp. Butter 4 cups Corn (fresh or frozen) 1 medium-large Onion, chopped 2 ½ lbs. Baking Potatoes

1 large Red Pepper, chopped 1 Tbsp. Salt ½ lb. Carrots, chopped ½ tsp. Pepper

1-2 tsp. Garlic, minced 1½ lbs Green Beans (fresh or frozen)

½ tsp. dried Thyme 2 Tbsp. White Balsamic Vinegar – or to taste

3 cups whole Milk 2 tsp. Liquid Smoke – or to taste

5 cups Water

Melt butter and saute onion, pepper, carrots, garlic, with thyme until soft.

Add milk, water and potatoes; simmer until potatoes are tender.

Stir in corn, salt and pepper.

With an immersion blender (or food processor) puree solids to desired consistency.

Add green beans and simmer until tender.

Add vinegar and liquid smoke to taste.

Makes 2 quarts.



RESTAURANT REVIEW 208 TALBOT

David Clark and his wife Valerie along with Curt Cummings and Paul Miln are now the chef/owners of this restaurant located on the main street in St. Michaels. David and Val ran the very successful Julia's Restaurant in Centreville. If you enjoyed Julia's, you will love the food and ambiance at 208 Talbot.

The restaurant is located at 208 Talbot Street almost directly opposite the entrance to the Chesapeake Bay Maritime Museum. The interior is reminiscent of Julia's, only bigger. There is a bar immediately upon

entering the restaurant. The dining rooms are physically separated from each other and from the bar, adding a very cozy feeling. Adding to this are exposed bricks on some of the walls. Sound levels were quiet.

The wait staff is pleasant, friendly, and knowledgeable. The night we were there, David prepared a number of specials that were not on the menu. Our waiter explained each one, including the ingredients, all without notes.

Cocktails and wines by the bottle or glass are available. The wine list is not long, but well thought out. For example, I started with a glass of Sauvignon Blanc from New Zealand and Mary enjoyed Prosecca from Italy. Both were served in the appropriate glasses and at the correct temperature.

The food; ah the food. David loves to mix things up with combinations of ingredients one doesn't expect. For example, an appetizer of Baked Oysters was presented topped with cured bacon and toasted pistachios in a jalapeno lime butter with cilantro oil and chopped scallions – delicious, with all the flavors blending beautifully. Another appetizer was Seared Sea Scallops served over Cauliflower puree with house cured bacon and balsamic reduction. Yum!

Mary's entrée was Veal Scaloppini served over house made linguine, roasted mushrooms, and Prosciutto in a Marsala wine sauce, finished with Parmesan Reggiano. The veal was tender, and the Marsala wine sauce was not overpowering. I had the Beef Short Ribs served over smoked Gouda risotto with French beans, sauced with a reduction of the natural jus and topped with gremolata. The short ribs were the best I ever had, fall-apart tender, moist with good beef flavor.

I wish I could tell you we passed on dessert, but we didn't. All desserts, even the ice cream, are made in house. How could we pass on a flourless chocolate cake with a dollop of real whipped cream? One dessert and two spoons later we were fat and happy!

208 Talbot is a white table cloth, fine dining restaurant. Prices are in line with other restaurants of this caliber. Appetizers range in price from \$9 for the Roasted Mushroom Bruschetta to \$13 for the Baked Oysters and Seared Sea Scallops. Entrees start at \$25 for a brined and then grilled Pork Rib Chop. The Rack of Lamb, oven roasted with a cauliflower-potato puree in a Port wine demi-glace, is \$36.
