## Musings from the Board

A few words about the Snow Removal Policy. First a little history. In 2009, a sub-committee of the Operations Committee was tasked to create guidelines on snow removal for the community. The original guidelines included a starting point of a 2 -inch accumulation and included all community driveways/sidewalks. When the HOA asked for bids, no one wanted to bid without a guaranteed retainer even if we had a winter without snow. Dennison finally agreed to take the contract and then sublet it out to the Sod Farm, the company we had when we had the horrendous winter four years ago.

The policy has been fine tuned to where it is now. Our contractor, who is not guaranteed anything unless he shows up, is called when we have at least a 3-inch of snow (Centreville clears streets at 4inches). Work is also segregated into 3 phases (we can opt for all, some, or just one - at the discretion of the Board liaison): 1) Clubhouse parking lots and sidewalks; 2) Unfinished roads; and/or 3) Homeowners' driveways and walks from the driveway to the front door. On corner houses, the driveways and a short path from the front door to the street will be cleared.

The contractor has been told that when they are doing homeowners' driveways to start at different locations in the community so that the same homes aren't last every time. The contract calls for calcium chloride to be applied where requested to driveways and walkways and rock salt for the roads. Homeowners who do not want chemicals applied should have a ribbon attached to their front lamp post.
On a snow day - homeowners will be notified via email by the property manager as to which phase will be done. At the January Board of Directors' Meeting, Manager Dennis Sesplankis reported that removal of the snow from the first two storms cost close to $\$ 31,000$. - Dave Peterson

The $17^{\text {th }}$ annual Great Backyard Bird Count will take place February 14 17. Launched in 1998 by the Cornell Lab of Ornithology and National Audubon Society, the Great Backyard Bird Count was the first online citizen-science project to collect data on wild birds and to display results in near real-time. All levels of experience may participate - beginner to advanced. To participate, tally the numbers and kinds of birds you see for at least 15 minutes on one or more days of the count in your yard. The information is then easily entered via the website. Go to the website for more information.

## GARDEN CLUB and VICTORY GARDEN - Jack Hennessey



Our decision to not harvest any of the flower seed pods was a good one. The birds were flocking to the gazebo in search of food during our cold and snowy January. In addition, management authorized us to install a thistle feeder, a sunflower feeder, and a suet feeder, which have attracted numerous and varied birds. The best time to observe these birds is about $7 \mathrm{a} . \mathrm{m}$. and 4 p.m. We have seen goldfinches, house finches, white throated sparrows, mourning doves, blue jays, juncos, cardinals, and mockingbirds. We have even seen an occasional woodpecker attracted to the suet feeder. Incidentally, K-Mart seems to be the best place to purchase bird supplies. Also, unless you want to attract starlings and English sparrows, do not use general purpose food, which contains lots of cracked corn and millet. I did observe an occasional hawk stalking our bird feeder, and actually saw a hawk swooping down to grab a songbird as it left our feeder. I guess that is part of the food chain. C'est la vie!

I have also started saving egg shells, which I grind up to provide calcium for the purple martins during their nesting season. They will be arriving early in April. Interested residents can check the martin migration pattern on their computer.

Steve Guy reports that two new gardeners will be joining us in the spring. However, one of our gardening teams has resigned. We still have room for four more gardeners (or teams). Steve will be scheduling two more "Group Work Parties," which were very successful last year. Contact Steve if you are interested in joining the Gazebo Flower Gardeners at 301-641-8728.

Weather permitting; we will start tilling the victory garden in time for spring planting, typically on St. Patrick's Day. Dave Peterson will be tuning up his tiller for the occasion. In the meantime, stay warm, and pray for an early thaw.

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## Calling AII Bluebird Lovers!



There is talk around the Village of promoting an increase in the housing of bluebirds in our community. Preliminary plans have been discussed to create a "bluebird trail" throughout Symphony Village, which would include both private properties and common areas.
With that in mind, there is now a plan to provide "official" bluebird houses (constructed by a local Boy Scout troop) to residents using a pre-paid/sign-up procedure. Each interested homeowner should sign-up in the Activities Book at the Clubhouse within a month's period (mid-February to mid-March), and provide $\$ 20$ in cash or check, to be kept temporarily by Nancy or Dennis. This pre-paid amount will not include payment for a pole/stake or predator guard. Residents will be provided "fact sheets" (with instructions for installing and monitoring the houses) when they pick up the houses.

Once the houses on private lots have been installed, then plans to add houses on common properties to "complete" the trail will follow. So, indicate your interest in the Activities Book beginning February 15 , along with a $\$ 20$ payment. The check should be made out to Boy Scout Troop \#1631 as indicated in the Activities Book. ## Winter Energy Saving Tips

## Minimize Drafts and Heat/Cooling Loss

1. Lock windows to ensure they're fully closed and sealed.
2. Close insulating shades or drapes, especially in rooms you're not using. Insulating shades such as closed-cell honeycomb really work.
3. If you have windows with a southern exposure, open the shades and drapes on sunny afternoons to let direct sunlight and solar warmth into the room. (Make sure ceiling fans are operating in reverse (blowing upward) mode.) Close shades as soon as direct sunlight wanes.
4. Check for air leaks around the exterior doors. If necessary, the clearance at the bottom of the door can be adjusted by raising/lowering the threshold (located on the floor, under the door). It is usually adjusted by turning the screws that hold it to the floor. A "sweep" can also be screwed to the bottom of the door if still drafty. If you have drafts around the sides or top of the door, self-adhesive foam insulation strips can be applied. (Available at a hardware store.)

## RESTAURANT REVIEW

## Basmati Restanrant

If you are looking for a different kind of food or if you enjoy Indian cuisine, my friends and I recommend Basmati restaurant. I have eaten there several times and enjoy their food. They have a lunch buffet, and you can order from the menu at lunch and dinner. One reason we have chosen to eat there is that they have vegan food. If you have a vegan in the family, it is a good choice. They will add tofu to any vegan dish.

The appetizer we ordered was Vegetable Samosa. This is a triangular pastry stuffed with potatoes and green peas, and then fried. It is delicious. The Samosa also can be ordered stuffed with meat and green peas.

The dishes we ordered were Chicken Tikka Masala (chicken breast pieces marinated in spices and yogurt, baked in a tandoor oven, and cooked in a tomato-based creamy sauce), Chicken Korma (mildly spiced chicken flavored with coconut and simmered in cream and nuts), Lamb Methi (pieces of lamb cooked with fenugreek in a curry sauce), and Chana Masala (chickpeas cooked with onions, tomatoes, and spices). Tofu was added to this dish. When you order your food, they ask you how much heat you want and cook it to your request. Flavorful basmati rice is served with the meal. We added to our
meal Tandoori Naan (bread baked in a clay oven (tandoor)). Our favorite desserts are Kheer (Indian rice pudding with almonds and raisins) and Kulfi (Indian ice cream made with condensed milk, almonds, pistachios, and rose water).

Basmati has a very long menu with many choices.
The restaurant is located at 2444 Solomon's Island Road (Route 2), Annapolis, between Chevy's and Harbor Mall. Lunch hours are Monday -Friday, 11:30 a.m. - 2:30 p.m., Saturday -Sunday, noon-3 p.m. Dinner hours are Sunday-Thursday, $5-9: 30$, Friday \& Saturday, 5-10:30 p.m. The phone number is 410-266-6355.

## RECIPE DF THE MONTH

Cheddar, Corn and Potato Bisque

From the Kitchen of Nancie Cameron
$1 / 4$ pound ( 1 stick) butter
3 yellow onions, chopped
3 Tbsp. flour
3 quarts vegetable broth
$7-8$ cups Yukon Gold potatoes, diced
1 large bag frozen yellow corn
3 cups whole milk


4 cups shredded sharp cheddar cheese 1-2 tsp. Chipotle chili pepper (to taste)
2 tsp. liquid smoke (to taste)
2-3 tsp. white balsamic vinegar (to taste)
Salt and Pepper to taste
Chopped parsley for garnish
$\checkmark$ In a large soup pot, melt butter over medium-high heat;
$\checkmark$ Sauté onion until tender.
$\checkmark$ Mix in flour, coating onion.
$\checkmark$ Add broth and bring to a boil, whisking constantly until smooth.
$\checkmark$ Reduce heat, add potatoes, and simmer 20 minutes or until tender.
$\checkmark$ Add corn and milk.
$\checkmark$ With an immersion blender, blend to "bisque" consistency.
$\checkmark$ Remove from heat and stir in cheddar cheese until melted.
$\checkmark$ Add chili pepper, liquid smoke, white balsamic vinegar, salt and pepper.
$\checkmark$ Garnish each serving with chopped parsley.
